Hello Troop 452!

What a great summer! Our boys participated in many fun and challenging activities! We had 4 scouts complete National Youth Leadership Training. This week long course teaches them the skills needed to lead other scouts. We had 38 scouts attend Summer Camp at Camp Crooked Creek. They earned well over 100 merit badges at camp. Sixteen people from our troop earned their 50 Miler Award, by completing a 51 mile canoe trip on the Little Miami River. More scouts earn the Eagle Rank than a 50 Mile Award. Five scouts and 2 adults had the experience of a lifetime at Florida's Seabase. And we will wrap up the summer with an exciting performance at the Tecumseh Outdoor Drama. Overall, this was a very exciting and fun summer.

I do want to take some time and talk about service. As scouts, we are required to give service to God, our country, and our community. But the one thing we often forget about is service to our troop. Troop 452 is very fortunate to have fundraisers that benefit the troop, as well as, the individual scout. Through fish fry, mulch, and popcorn sales, scouts can add funds to their accounts to help pay for outings, gear, or trainings. Our troop raises funds by working the Flying Pig marathon, the Hudy 14K, the Amazing Race, and July Fest. These funds pay for all the merit badges the scouts earn, purchase supplies, and replace and buy new equipment for the Troop. Without these fundraisers, we would have to ask each family to pay for the necessary items the troop needs. In addition, it is not fair that a small portion of families are attending the Troop fundraisers, which benefit all scouts. It is my expectation that

each family work at least two of our four fundraising events. This is not too much to ask, since many families work all four events. If a family does not help, then we will have to come up with another way for the family to support the troop. It is critically necessary to keep our troop supplied with the best equipment and supplies-not to mention—purchasing all their merit badges. If you have any questions regarding my expectation, please let me know, otherwise-note that our next fundraiser is the Hudy 14K in September-space is still available to help.

I look forward to the many fun and adventurous events we still have in 2014!



Boy/Cub Scout TRIVIA

Question: When did Cub Scouting become part of the Scouting Organization?

Answer: In England, younger boys were eager to become Boy Scouts. In 1914, Baden-Powell began implementing a program for younger boys that was based on Rudyard Kipling's Jungle Book. The Wolf Cub program began in 1916, and since that time, Wolf Cubbing has spread to other European countries with very little change.

In America, hundreds of Cub Scoutage boys and their families were clamoring for a program of their own. As early as 1920, Scout executives at the first national training conference discussed the needs of younger boys. The BSA, however, felt it wise to postpone any action until there was more objective evidence.

In 1925, Dr. Huber W. Hurt, a research psychologist and veteran Scouter, was authorized to study existing organizations for younger boys. He worked closely with Ernest Thompson Wolf (age 9), Bear (age 10), and Lion Seton. Both men recommended that the BSA adopt a program for younger boys, with older Boy Scouts as leaders, to tie into home, church, school, and Boy Scouting.

By 1929, the new Cubbing program (it Cub Scouting in America is different wasn't called "Cub Scouting" until several years later) was taking shape and was introduced as a demonstration project in a limited number of communities. Its structure was similar to today's Cub Scouting, except that dens were led by Boy Scout den chiefs. The plan included a neighborhood mothers' committee to encourage Cubs and den chiefs.

In 1930, Cub Scouting was formally launched, with 5,102 boys registered at the end of that first year. Cubs advanced from Bobcat (for all new members) to (age 11) and joined a Boy Scout troop at age 12. In 1949, the age requirement was lowered to between 8 and 10 for Cub Scouts. In 1982, Tiger Cubs was started.
